Board of Education OKs budget

Although the Unicoi County Board of Education does not yet have the answer to the lingering question of just how much revenue Unicoi County Schools will receive in the upcoming fiscal year, a looming deadline to ensure the receipt of state funding forced the board to take action last week.

The board unanimously approved the school system's general purpose budget for the 2017-18 fiscal year during a brief

special-called meeting held Tuesday, May 30. The overall 2017-18 budget for Unicoi County Schools is \$21,930,101. The original budget for the 2016-17 fiscal year reflected both revenues and expenditures in the amount of \$23,804,277.

"We know it was a very difficult budget year with another round of cuts," Unicoi County Director of Schools John English said to the board during last week's meet-

ing. "I appreciate your work over the last couple of months working through this, talking through some different possibilities."

The unavoidable uncertainty surrounding 2017-18 revenues had been discussed at meetings leading up to last Tuesday's session. To make sure their system receives state Basic Education Program funding, school boards must pass their system's new fiscal year bud-

get by June 1. However, final BEP estimates and other projected revenues needed to paint a clearer budgetary picture are often unavailable until after early June. The new fiscal year begins on July 1.

This is the situation the Unicoi County Board of Education found itself in with the 2017-18 fiscal year budget for Unicoi County Schools. Still, revenues totaling \$21,930,101 are projected in the

county's school board. State education funding makes up the bulk of a school system's funding, and that figure is currently projected at more than \$13.7 million for Unicoi County Schools in 2017-18.

But English said this number could change in either direction between now and the end of June. The county schools system began receiving Basic Education Program, or BEP, funding estimates from the state in April. From April to May, the system saw its estimated share of state funding increase

First butane lab found in county

A new threat has made its way to the Valley Beautiful, according to local law enforcement officials.

On Monday, June 5, the Unicoi County Sheriff's Department discovered what Sheriff Mike Hensley described as the first "butane lab" to be found in the county in a room at the Best Southern Motel located on Jackson-Love Highway

Hensley said a deputy visited the room to serve a warrant for failure to pay fines and costs and spotted the lab, which led to the investigation and the arrest of Katrena Star Bowers, 36, of Erwin. Hensley said Bowers had been living there for approximately two years.

'They use wax to enhance the THC in marijuana," Hensley said of the lab and its process. "It is highly flammable. We have called in the Meth Task Force to come

and dispose of the materials." A UCSD meth technician, wear-

ing protective clothing in order to enter the motel room and remove materials, was working the scene on Monday. The Erwin Police Department and Erwin Fire Department were also at the scene. Erwin Police Chief Regan Tilson also confirmed that this was the first butane lab his department has seen in the county.

According to information available online from the U.S. Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA), a butane lab is used to create a marijuana concentrate that can have a THC (Tetrahydrocannabinol) level of 40-80 percent, which is much stronger than the average 20 percent level of "high grade" mar-

"Being a highly concentrated form of marijuana, the effects upon the user may be more psychologically and physically intense than plant marijuana use," the DEA
